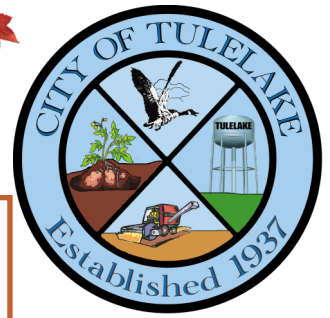

ELECTION DAY

November 5, 2024 is election day! Let your voice be heard, be an educated voter and do your research before casting your vote! If you are not a registered voter, you can get a registration form at the Post Office, City Hall or online through the California Secretary of State (registertovote.ca.gov).



You must be a United States Citizen, a resident of California, not imprisoned, not on parole for the conviction of a felony and at least 18 years old at the time of the election. You must be registered at least 15 days prior to an election to be eligible to vote in that election.

Don't forget to move your clock backward one hour on Sunday, November 03, 2024. Daylight Savings Time Ends!



TULELAKE BUTTE-VALLEY FAIR

The 73rd annual Tulelake Butte Valley Fair will take place September 5-8, 2024 where we will celebrate the theme "Where the Countryside Meets the Carnival"! Come and enjoy seeing the animals and visiting with friends.



There will be a minimal admission fee of \$4 per person, Thursday through Saturday. Children 5 and under are free and Sunday will be free admission for everyone.

The fair is selling Admission Season passes for \$10 per person. Carnival wristbands are \$35 pre-sale and \$45 at the door. A Carnival Unlimited 4-Day Pass can be purchased for \$85 (includes a 32oz souvenir cup).

Don't miss out on the live tribute to The Eagles "One Of These Nights". Thursday, September 5, doors open at 6:30, concert starts at 7:30. General Admission \$10. Travis Denning live on concert Friday September 6th doors open at 6pm show starts at 8pm- \$25 for general admission. The Destruction Derby will be Saturday, September 7th. Gates open at 6pm and the show starts at 7pm- \$20 for general admission.

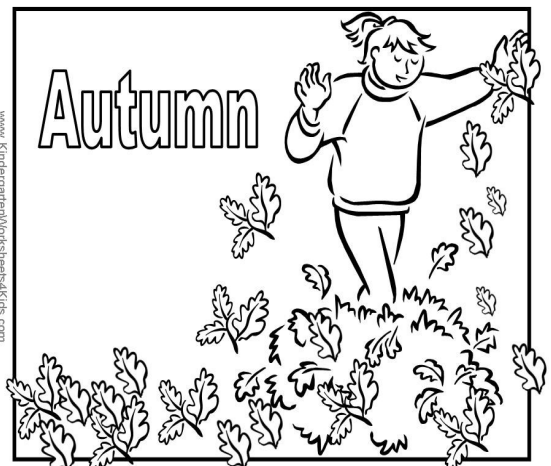
WATER METERS

BUS SERVICE IN TULELAKE - SAGE STAGE

The Sage Stage operates a bus that makes one round trip on Thursdays from Alturas to Klamath Falls, stopping in Tulelake to pick up passengers. The bus stops at Ross Market, located at the corner of E and Main Streets. Regular round trip fare is \$12.00. Discount fare is \$9.00 round trip and is available for seniors, children (0-12 years) accompanied by a fare-paying adult and disabled persons meeting ADA criteria.

The Sage Stage operates by reservation. Please call at least one day in advance to reserve your trip. Same day reservations or walk-on's are accepted when possible but be aware that the bus will not run unless there is at least one confirmed reservation. DOG LICENSES

A final reminder that dog licenses must be obtained for ALL dogs within the City limits. Dog licenses are now considered late. All dogs must have proof of rabies vaccination before a license will be issued. Not having a dog license is a violation of City Ordinance 6.04 and an Administrative Citation of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$500.00 may be issued, for each violation, to anyone not in compliance.
